

The Latin American Studies minor is a course of study in the liberal arts that **provides students** with an understanding of the many facets of Latin American literature and history, society and culture, economics and politics, ecology and environment, languages, arts, and humanities. Students are given the opportunity to study the Latino experience in the United States and explore global issues that impact indigenous, Afro-descendants, and ethnically diverse communities of Latin America, such as migration, displacement, mobilization, and the pursuit of social justice.

Minor Requirements

The Latin American Studies minor is available to students in any major. Six courses are required. Students must take:

- Two Spanish language courses at the 207 level or higher
- Four additional courses related to Latin American Studies. We are a vibrant program that engages students and faculty across multiple disciplines in the study of Latin America, including Art History, Conflict Resolution, Environmental Science, History, International Relations, Modern Languages, Music, Political Science, Social Justice, and Sociology. (The complete list of eligible courses can be found in the College Catalog.)
- Students must incorporate a study away/cultural immersion experience with a focus on Latin America in consultation with the LAS director.

Spanish majors/minors interested in an LAS minor may use up to two 200-, 300-, or 400-level SPN courses towards the minor.
